Eve Tuck, Associate Professor in the Department of Social Justice Education at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, revisits her highly influential article published in *Decolonization: Indigeneity, Education, and Society*.

Eve Tuck works on the ethics of social science and educational research, Indigenous social and political thought, decolonizing research methodologies and theories of change, and the consequences of neoliberal accountability policies on school completion. She is an award-winning author and is the recipient of an early career award from the Committee of Scholars of Color on Education, of the American Educational Research Association. Dr. Tuck's writings have appeared in *Harvard Educational Review*, *International Journal of Qualitative Studies in Education*, *Journal for the International Society on Teacher Education*, *Urban Review*, and several edited volumes. Tuck is an enrolled member of the Aleut Community of St. Paul Island, Alaska.

Eric Ritskes is a 5th year PhD candidate in Sociology and Equity Studies in Education at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE), at the University of Toronto. His work exists at the intersections of sociology, education, and digital humanities - and how decolonization might be developed at these intersections. He is the founding editor of the acclaimed, open access, interdisciplinary journal *Decolonization: Indigeneity, Education, and Society* that brings together discussions of Indigenous knowledges and decolonization from around the globe, examining their intersections and divergences, and the possibilities for societal transformation.

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
